Background and Rationale:

International students are one of the largest and fastest growing categories in the global mobility of the world today. Technically called sojourners, they are among migrants undergoing psycho-cultural adaptation. In Europe alone, over 1,5 mln. students have participated in Erasmus exchange program over its 20 years of successful implementation; 150,000 last year only.

Although the official aim of European Region Action Scheme for the Mobility of University Students is to "encourage and support academic mobility of higher education students and teachers within the European Union", we can give it less technical but more psycho-cultural sense. It can be defined as facilitation of creation of a new European identity among the youth from EU's member states, through the process of academic and experiential culture learning as well as interpersonal bonding. This is a noble goal, carried by idealistic values but also very practical in terms of its implementation via the leading institutions of higher education.

After almost a quarter century of experience and fast growth, it is the time to ask the program evaluation questions: How well has the reality of ERASMUS program met the goal for which it was created? What are the consequences of participation in the program for acquisition of cultural knowledge, better understanding, linguistic competence, cooperation, non-prejudicial and amiable relations among young Europeans? Have there been any impediments on the road to meet these objectives? How can the specialists of inter-cultural relations help in making the program even more effective and attractive?

These are the questions posed by cross-cultural psychologists to our colleagues: researchers and practitioners around Europe, and more broadly, around the world. To answer them we need an international conference, and hence our initiative.

Conference goals

The conference has a triple goal:

- To examine the assumptions laid down for Erasmus by the program founders and possibly modified by the leaders of today. This is the question about philosophy and policies which we are addressing to European and national administrators and coordinators;
- What evidence emerges from empirical studies investigating participants' process of adaptation to the host cultures and learning outcomes measured in terms of new competencies, attitudes, etc?. Are there any phenomena which escaped imagination of the planners, and which have been discovered by the researchers? – These questions are directed to experts working in the domain of acculturation and intercultural psychology.
- Professional know how in helping the process of psychocultural adaptation at individual, group, and institutional levels. What have intercultural psychologists done to facilitate the process? What kind of institutional innovations have been introduced at the level or receiving universities? As

organizers, we will provide a forum for discussion and information sharing about adaptation in the format of workshops, integration activities, and round table discussions.

Meet the- students- and -Work- with- them sessions will be organized.

The venue and the organizing institution

The conference will be hosted at The Warsaw School of Social Sciences and Humanities (http://www.swps.edu.pl).

The School was established in 1996. The School takes pride for being of the best non-profit and non-public higher education institutions in Poland. According to various rankings and the opinion of University Accreditation Commission (a governmental accreditation body), we offer the best psychology program in Poland. It is also the largest, housing over 8,000 psychology students in three cities: Warsaw, Wrocław, and Gdańsk.

Many of the IACCP members still keep vivid memories of XV Congress of our association which was organized by the Warsaw School in Pultusk in 2000.

Since the academic year 2001/2002 Warsaw School of Social Sciences and Humanities has participated in the **Erasmus Program**. Now it cooperates with 49 academic institutions within the European Union.

SWPS provides specialisations and courses in cross-cultural psychology, cross-cultural research programmes are conducted. Psycho-cultural adaptation workshops are organized for incoming and outgoing students and administrative staff as well as scientific research in the field of students mobility. Our motto at the Warsaw School is to integrate theoretically oriented research with applied psychology.

Dates and Tentative program:

The date of the conference has been planned for the last week-end of September, just before a new academic year 2009/10. This will allow us to have uninterrupted access to all lecture halls at the School; at the same time a new batch of Erasmus students will be available for workshop demonstrations.

The conference is intended to be a three day event.

Abstract Submission:

Interested researchers in inter-/cross-cultural psychology and professional practitioners in the field of psycho-cultural adaptation are invited to submit their proposals for: symposia, workshops, panel discussions individual paper contributions, and posters. Symposia (group submissions), based on pre-organized research programs, preferably in international cooperation, are particularly encouraged.

Symposia should have 4-5 research contributors from more than one country and will be allocated a 2hr slot.

Workshops are presentations of professional *know-how* in the domain of conference interests. Activities fostering psycho-cultural adaptation and learning will be given priority. Workshops can last up to 3 hrs.

Workshop groups will consist of Erasmus students starting their sojourn in Warsaw and conference participants to enable transfer of skills in conditions of a real workshop work.

Poster sessions will consist of presentations of adaptation programmes (i.e. workshops, orientation programmes) and will be organized in parallel with workshops.

Submission Forms will be available as from November 15, when the website will be opened. Submissions should be written in English, which will be the conference official language.

Abstract Submission Deadline: 1st of February, 2009

Acceptance decisions will be announced on April 15, 2009.

Conference publication:

A post-conference book, covering the three themes of its program, is planned by the organizers; to be published in 2010.
